One of my fondest memories of my Grandma Heeren was the party day for her 100th birthday. She lived in a nursing home in central Illinois. Her four children, most of her 14 grandchildren, a few great-grandchildren, and one great-granddaughter were present. The latter was our first grandchild, Hannah, and we were able to get the cherished five-generation photograph. It was a great day to connect again with a family that is spread far and wide and, of course, celebrate a century of life.

The most meaningful part for me, came before the party even started. Wayne and I arrived early, as I wanted to spend some time with Grandma before everyone else got there. I should mention that Grandma had severe dementia. One time, when I visited, she introduced me to her roommate six times, and in half of them, I was her eldest grandchild, and in the other half, I was her niece. Sometimes, she still thought her twin sister was alive or that my grandpa, who died when I was five, would be coming home from work.

When we entered her room, I reminded her who I was, and she said, "Yes, I know." Good start. Then she said it was nice that we had come to visit. I told her that we were here for a party, and she asked, "What party?" Me: "Grandma, it's your birthday?" Her: "It is?!" Me: "Yes, Grandma. Do you know how old you are?" Her: "No, 80?" Me: "No." Her: "90?" Me: "No, higher." Her: "95?" Me: "No, Grandma, you are 100 years old today!" Her: "No! I can't be that old." That conversation played out a few times. Later, I saw my aunt bringing in the cake. Me: "Oh, look, Jeanette is bringing in your cake." Her: "What cake?" Me: "It's your birthday party, Grandma, and everyone is coming to celebrate with you." Her: "Oh, that's nice." My brother arrived, as did our son's family, and these conversations repeated again and again.

As the day unfolded, Grandma was finally on board with it being her birthday and that she was 100. She even blew out her numeral 1,0,0 candles, and put her finger in the frosting of the cake like a child and licked it off. What brought me such joy that day was her joy. While dementia isn't usually something that we celebrate, that day, it was a blessing. Grandma got to live over and over again the wonder of turning 100, and the joy of anticipating a party with her family. How cool is that!?

We are entering the season of Advent, which prepares us for Christmas. We do this each year, over and over again. And each time, we wait with anticipation for the joy of Christmas. Unlike Grandma, we know that it is coming, but we do so with a renewed waiting and longing. Each year, the world, our families, and our lives have been and are going through different experiences. We wait for Christmas assured that Christ came into our world long ago, that Christ continues to meet us in this life through his cross and resurrection, and that Christ will come again on that glorious last day to make all things new.

Our Advent worship is characterized by waiting and longing, a movement from darkness to light. Our scripture readings further prepare us for the gospel announcement that "to you is born this day, a Savior, the Messiah who is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2:11) The growing anticipation of Advent unfolds into the delight of Christmas. Our promised Lord comes bringing God's grace, love, and mercy to a world in need. Thanks be to God!


Pioneer Club



Faith Medical Response Team Update

November 20, 2024

Dear Members of Zion:

With flu season approaching, The Council wishes to keep you and our entire congregation healthy and safe. Please continue to use sanitizer often and regularly throughout the service. Sharing of the peace is at your own discretion, but feel free to provide a peace sign instead of a handshake to avoid touching others during this time of year.

Pastor will be performing hand hygiene throughout the service. At this time, we will continue the traditional practice of communion. When you receive holy communion, please place your hands cupped, with palms up, so that Pastor Elizabeth may drop the wafer into your hand without making contact. This will help prevent the spread of germs. Wine or juice is served in single serving disposable cups. Please touch what you take and take what you touch. If it is tight, give the cup a twist. Individual communion kits will be available for those who wish to commune from the pew or from home. Again, please avoid touching multiple kits.

If you are feeling ill, awaiting a test result, have been exposed, or have a known illness, please stay home. We welcome you to join us virtually, live on Facebook or via Vimeo. Prior to entering church, please self-screen; if you are experiencing any of the following, we respectfully ask that you worship remotely:

- -Cough or shortness of breath -Tested positive for Covid, Influenza, RSV, or Strep in the last 10 days
- -Difficulty breathing -Awaiting a test result for Covid, Influenza, RSV, or Strep
- -Loss of taste or smell -Been exposed to Covid, Influenza, RSV, or Strep
- -Muscle or body aches -Traveled internationally in the last 10 days
- -Fever or Sore throat
- -Nausea, Vomiting, or Diarrhea

Zion continues to follow CDC guidelines which includes improving ventilation and screening those in attendance. While you are encouraged to self-screen and self-test with an at-home Covid-19 testing kit, please know that a negative result does not exclude other contagious illnesses. Masking is optional and respectful. Feel free to wear a mask without discrimination. Vaccines are available for Covid, RSV, pneumonia, and influenza. Please discuss your options and eligibility with your primary care provider. Finally, if you or a family member falls ill with Covid, RSV, Influenza, or a streptococcal infection (Strep throat, pneumonia, or sepsis), please notify the church office. We will keep your name confidential. The safety of the congregation is our priority.
