Gratitude and Generosity

I attended a seminar put on by our synod as continuing education for pastors. The guest presenter was Dr. Rolf Jacobson from Luther Seminary. These were some things that really stood out for me.

He was saying how resentment and entitlement are the most corrosive things to attack our faith. Resentment he defined as looking at our neighbor and saying that they don't deserve what they have – their possessions, money, happiness, etc. Dr. Jacobson heard this said about how resentment acts on us. "It is like swallowing poison and waiting for the enemy to die." Not a very comforting thought! Then, he offered the antidote or cure for resentment as *Gratitude*.

Gratitude opens a window in the soul to the kingdom of God. Dr. Jacobson shared his own spiritual practice with us. Each morning, his prayer is in the form of a list of things for which he is thankful. Simple! The act of being grateful builds our inner well-being.

Entitlement he defined as looking at ourselves and saying that we have earned and deserve all that we have and even more. Remember the Grinch? He was resentful of all that the Whos in Whoville had, and when he took their stuff (thinking that would include their happiness), he felt entitled to it. Thankfully, he had a change of heart. Jacobson posits that the cure for entitlement is *Generosity*.

He talked about a study that showed the happiest people are the most generous. Often, in the church, when stewardship rolls around, we can get edgy about asking people to commit, be generous, or that really scary word, tithe. A pastor once said to me, "Never apologize for inviting people to be generous; it is an act that leads to great joy." My personal witness wholeheartedly agrees.

I would go so far as to say that Gratitude produces Generosity. When we are thankful for what has been given to us, how can we not want to share it and be generous? We are grateful for the love of God given to us in Jesus Christ, and that love produces love in all the ways that we have been gifted to do so - our relationships, our serving, our offerings, and more.

Zion's Mission and Ministry are made possible by our Gratitude and Generosity. I invite you to prayerfully discern how God is calling you to be Generous in ways that will bring you great joy and will serve to build up the Kingdom of God.

Advent Soup & Study




